Last month I announced my appointment of Guy Conti as Region 3's ombudsman. Guy's contact info as listed in the on-line Mensa Directory is: Guy T. Conti, 8372 Barrington Dr., Superior Township, MI 48198. 734-418-8474 (gconti AT gmail DOT com). Guy's appointment was prompted by our National Ombudsman Dave Cahn's desire to have Region ombudsmen for every Region. Duties that I can foresee Guy, an attorney and mediator by profession and former Mensa Membership Officer, assume include assistance with the resolution of disputes that may be referred to me, complaints about me, problems between any number of Region 3 local groups, or anything that arises in groups that do not have their own ombudsman. Of course, I know no one in Region 3, including myself, will have to contact Guy. Our Region just isn't that kind of Region.

Speaking of ombudsmen, please check your local roster of officers. If an ombudsman is not listed, consider providing that service to your local group. You need not be one who attends all meetings; you just need to be someone who can listen to all sides of any issue and help facilitate a resolution acceptable to all parties. In addition, ombudsmen should not be voting members of their boards. If a mediator or arbitrator is listed and not also designated ombudsman, ask your board of directors to meet the minimum standard by-laws requirement that each local group have an ombudsman. Your mediator or arbitrator can be also designated the ombudsman and a simple motion, passed by your local board of directors, can facilitate that.

A Good Recipe

Our recipe for a good time is aptly named "Not a Normal Pool Party."

Not a Normal Pool Party - Master Chef, Julie Stout

Ingredients:

- 1) Interested and motivated RAM Mensans;

Venue Review: MAG Tapas Night

What a wonderful opportunity to learn lots of new things! Very quickly, we learned that U of R's Memorial Art Gallery consists of The Atrium, with great food and live entertainment; The Gallery Store, where we were able to amuse ourselves and pick up a few things; the art gallery proper, where you'd better not let them see you taking pictures; and numerous workshops where many eager minds – young and old alike – were learning all about art. I have been corresponding with Jim to express our group's interest in arranging an exclusive tour with a highly qualified, expert tour guide. Jim spoke with his boss, Lab Administrator Janet Anderson-Seaquist, and today (Monday, September 26, 2011) she gave him the go ahead to book a tour for RAM members. These are the parameters that were discussed:

- It would be an exclusive tour and Jim Wesley is highly qualified;
- In mid to late November or beyond; in some ways, mid December to mid January would be good – we have some teachers in the crowd;
- On a Thursday or Friday Night, after hours;
- Around 6:00ish with approx 45 minute to 1 hour tour (plus or minus);
- Followed by dinner – We will make arrangements but please feel free to make any suggestions. Somewhere close by - perhaps within walking distance - would be nice (Jim Wesley will make suggestions also);
- Maybe the Dinosaur? Not sure how many would consider that walking distance... but it may be a possibility (I'll drive, thanks!);
- Jim will be our guest for dinner; members will be "Dutch treat";
- However, no cost or "admission" to our members for the tour;
- We'll probably try for a 7:30 dinner reservation if possible to allow time for getting there, wherever it is, and maybe a cocktail before dinner;
- We must require our members to RSVP because there is a strict limit of 25 people for this type of private, after-hours tour and one guide;
- Especially for a Thursday, we generally start breaking up by 9 or 9:30 anyway, so we wouldn't necessarily be out too late... However, certainly sometimes we and occasionally Jim, too, have been known to allow an interesting, enjoyable conversation to go on "forever" – as long as it's interesting and enjoyable!

For members who don't necessarily want to do the tour, or if we meet the maximum allowed, any of our members can join us for dinner. However, this also would be RSVP required. We'll need a firm count for the restaurant. If you want the tour and no dinner, also let us know.

The current next step is for Jim Wesley to examine his and the lab's schedule and determine which dates, if any, can be ruled out or ruled in. As mentioned, Jim also could be instrumental in helping us find a venue for dinner. In other words, we're *currently in negotiations*. ☺

Because participation is limited, once we determine a firm date and time, we will set a date and time to announce the date and time. (Sounds like doubletalk, doesn't it? Maybe even tripletalk! ☺) But seriously, once we announce the date and time, it will have to be first come, first served.

This started out with the simple concept of a Non-Costume Party, and that segment remains central to the event. We decided to book two adjoining rooms at a centrally located motel to accommodate our members and guests and to provide a setting where, well... okay – where we didn't have to tip anyone and be out by nine or ten o'clock. And with two rooms, we could have more than one conversation going on at once, without the usual benign but inevitable crosstalk.

We have expanded the scope to include two nights, and *voilà* – now we have an open house! This is good, for we will be able to meet more new faces, we believe, and have more time to discuss important issues such as deciding the fate of the world and all the other critical matters we attend to... and have lots of fun while doing it.

Two rooms with two queen-sized beds each means that we have accommodation for 8 to 10 people (must be a pullout or something). We have arranged special rates for those associated with the event and the staff will be happy to assign a room in close proximity if you like, of course subject to availability. We are allowed free breakfast for those staying over, officially 8 or 10 of us (who counts?), where you can make your own Belgian waffles, eat scrambled eggs, bacon, the usual fare. (5:30 am to 9:30 am *sharp!*)
